

## A CONFLUENCE OF NOSTALGIA & NARRATIVE

Akshat Bhatt of Architecture Discipline crafts a heady mix of nostalgia, detailed drama and material marvel at Ziya in The Oberoi, Gurugram TEXT BY MEHAR DEEP KAUR PHOTOGRAPHY BY JEETIN SHARMA

**JAGZTER** 

n a time driven by immediacy, stillness is a rare luxury. And a slow meal? Almost radical. It calls for presence, patience and pleasure. At Ziya's new home within the water-laced architecture of The Oberoi, Gurugram, that spirit of unhurried indulgence finds a physical form. Conceptualised by Akshat Bhatt of Architecture Discipline along the lines of contemporary nostalgia, the restaurant unfurls like a sensorial thali, each element distinct yet collectively whole.

Here, repose is staged through the lyricism of curvaceous forms, clean lines, warm woods and old-world textures that make time feel expansive. Nothing about its design settles for simplicity. The first clue? A portal-like entrance clad in fire-fused glass and aged timber; equal parts time machine and teaser. Step further inside, a statement table greets you; sculptural, lustrous and so fluid that you'd think it was poured into this space. "A conversation starter that shimmers in liquid metal," muses Akshat. To one side, deep blue dining pods cocoon diners in curved intimacy, wrapped in arcs of metal foil. "We were inspired by the aroma of caramelised sugar that we'd catch as kids from a candy floss maker on his bicycle," he reveals, highlighting the glass-topped table, which is ambered like caramel. Its base is shaped like a chess piece and modelled after the playful geometry of Channapatna toys.

Look up, and the ceiling swoops in quiet parallel. Sinuous grooves echo the central table's silhouette, exaggerating perspective and guiding the gaze. Each zone plays its part deftly: a bar gleaming in metallic leaf work, a server station discreetly tucked away, a private dining room and cosy tables along the glazed facade enjoying panoramic views. Throughout, it's the discerning details that ensure poetic cadence: the timeless charm of monolithic chairs, the glow of hand-formed sconces and bespoke chandeliers, all grounded by a rich walnut parquet underfoot. Much like its menu reimagined Indian fare with a reverence for origins - Ziya's interiors are steeped in memory and finesse, with Architecture Discipline delivering a space where belonging becomes a matter of mood
